




THE START OF A TREND

At one time, you had to know someone who owned a Frank Lloyd Wright-designed home and hope that they might invite you for an overnight stay. That changed in 1992 with the first rental of the Seth Peterson Cottage. At the time, ours was the only Wright home that could be rented by the public. The rental was established by the Seth Peterson Cottage Conservancy in order to raise funds to care for the Cottage in perpetuity. Other ideas were considered, such as depending on open house visitors for revenue. None of the other options, however, were deemed capable of raising sufficient funds for the maintenance of the Cottage.

Our idea began a trend. As other non-profit operators of Wright-designed homes sought to find ways to raise adequate funds to support their operation, they adopted our idea, and now there are several other Frank Lloyd Wright-designed homes that can be rented for overnight stays. One has even been converted into a bed and breakfast. Of course, we want people to stay at the Seth Peterson Cottage, but you should have the opportunity to enjoy other Frank Lloyd Wright homes as well. We won't list those homes here, but with a quick Google search you can quickly locate them.

Winter is finally getting over and there is nothing better than spring at Mirror Lake! The plants all start to come out of the ground and pretty soon the gray browns of the woods will be a multitude of greens.

Spring is also the time that the Mirror Lake Association starts to gear up and get ready for another busy season. Spring cleaning time is upon us and we give the lake and the surrounding area a good going over by picking up trash that has found its way along the roadsides.

Spring also means that we start testing the lake water. For many years, Mirror Lake volunteers have tested the quality of the lake water. We test for clarity and different chemicals to make sure the water is a good habitat for the animals that live and swim there, including humans! Mirror Lake water has traditionally been very clear and chemical free.

This summer we will also start our second year of doing "Clean Boats, Clean Water" boat checks at the boat ramps to make sure invasive species do not enter the lake. We have a group of volunteers and hire some college-age students to inspect and educate boaters as to the importance of not bringing live plants or animals into Mirror Lake. Many affect the natural plants and animals that live there. Much of our funds to support this program come from a grant from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

We will also continue to look at other ways to maintain and improve the quality of the lake and surrounding area so that it will remain a natural area for all people and animals to enjoy.

CONTROLLING WEEDS IN MIRROR LAKE

The Mirror Lake Association, with donations from the Seth Peterson Cottage Conservancy, recently purchased several pieces of equipment at the Wisconsin Lakes Convention that can be used by Association members to remove shoreline weeds from Mirror Lake.


The Weed Razor™ is attached to a 25-foot rope which is thrown out and over the area to be cleaned. It is then pulled back using short hard-jerking motions. The cut weeds are raked up with the 11 foot long 37 inch wide Weed Raker™ and composted away from the shoreline.



The Swifter Sifter, a perforated aluminum basket which is attached to

three 25-foot ropes, is thrown out over the area to be cleaned and allowed to sink to the bottom. Then the basket is pulled back to clean debris from the lake bottom. It can also be used with two floats to skim weeds and algae from the lake's surface.

The equipment owned by the Mirror Lake Association may only be used on Mirror Lake thereby preventing the spread of invasive species between lakes. Specific rules about removing weeds are outlined in Wisconsin NR 109.

The Seth Peterson Cottage Conservancy is pleased to support the Association's efforts to keep Mirror Lake's shoreline attractive to residents and guests while maintaining healthy native aquatic plant communities throughout the lake. MIRROR LAKE STATE PARK REPORT

We have made it through another long, cold winter, and once again look forward to springtime's great increase of activity in the park. We spend a great deal of time in the fall and winter working on equipment and maintaining and grooming the park's 19 miles of cross-country ski trails. While this year was not one for the record books in terms of snow accumulation, we did see good numbers of skiers when there was snow on the ground. With the end of winter we see the end of our ski season, but also the promise of spring and all the excitement that season holds.

To make grooming the trails easier, we upgraded some of our equipment this year. We purchased and installed a track system for our John Deere Gator utility vehicle and added a cab to allow for a little more operator comfort and protection from the elements. This vehicle combines the tracks and snow travel capabilities of a snowmobile with the ease of use and maneuverability of a utility vehicle. It can also be used year-round versus sitting in the shed for the winter. While we have kept our "new" snowmobile (2002 model) we will use the Gator as our primary piece of equipment for winter trail grooming. We are excited to discover all of its capabilities. Having a vehicle that is easier to operate should allow staff to pay more attention to the grooming details making a better ski experience for our park visitors.

Some of you may have noticed a great number of trees blown down and limbs broken off throughout the park. A very strong and localized storm hit the park near the end of the summer. We had significant damage across the park and lost hundreds of trees. Every trail was closed, with many trees lying across them, and there were dozens of sites covered with broken branches and toppled trees. We were extraordinarily fortunate that no one was injured, and only one vault toilet received minor damage. Even nestled in the woods, the Cottage received no significant impact from the storm beyond a few trees which fell in the area and across the driveway. Our crew and staff from Forestry and other parks in the area spent weeks getting trails and campsites reopened. Several homes and private businesses in the area were affected as well. We will continue to see tree mortality from damage received in this storm for several years. It is a good opportunity to note that many areas of the park are managed in a passive way, allowed to stay in as natural a state as possible. Many people see all the downed trees and wonder why we do not harvest them or cut them up for firewood. While both of these management tools are used at the park, we primarily use them in areas that are managed for more intensive recreation. So, if you see many downed trees in the more remote locations of the park, it

is likely they will remain as habitat for wildlife, decomposing and returning their nutrients to the soil.

Spring and summer will see some exciting programs at our new amphitheater, and we will provide some interesting programming for our park visitors to the Cottage. It is our hope to not only provide an engaging educational program for park visitors, but also to expose many new people to the Cottage by encouraging them to visit during the open house days. We can build a stronger partnership between the Conservancy and the park while providing more opportunities for our visitors.

As always, the seasons change and we keep up with Mother Nature as best we can. Spring will see our staff getting trails, campsites and buildings ready for the summer. Every year we have a few surprises, but the staff always rises to the challenges. We are excited to see the park come to life and await the increase of visitors. □

SUCCESS COMES FROM VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers make up the core of the success of the Seth Peterson Cottage Conservancy. There are fifteen volunteers that make up the Board of Directors that determine policies and practices for the Conservancy. 2015 COTTAGE WORK WEEK

This year's Cottage work week was Sunday, April 12 to Friday, April 17.

One major project was the replacement of the buried electrical supply cable that runs from the main breaker panel in the storage shed to the breaker panel in the cottage. The original cable was direct buried in 1992; was replaced with PVC conduit and new cable.

During a major wind storm last August we lost a handful of beautiful large oak and maple trees around the Cottage property. We cleaned up as much of the downed trees as we could during the week and added the wood to our supply of firewood for next winter. Experienced chainsaw help is always necessary for this task!

Also during the week the glass cooktop in the kitchen, which was damaged when something was dropped on it by one of our guests, was replaced.

Other annual work week projects include cleaning up the landscaping, cleaning the flagstone floor in the cottage, shampooing the upholstery, cleaning and inventorying the kitchen cabinets and many small cleaning and repair projects.

Bill Martinelli (608-238-8355) once again headed up the volunteer efforts during this flurry of activity. □

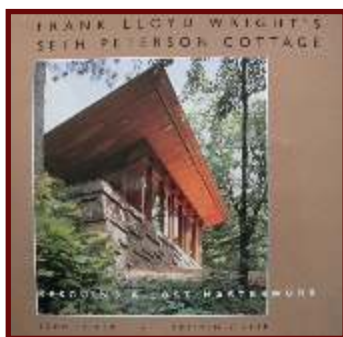

RESCUING A LOST MASTERWORK

Interior Finishes and Furnishings

This is the seventeenth in a series of excerpts from the book, Frank Lloyd Wright's Seth Peterson Cottage: Rescuing a Lost Masterwork, by John Eifler, AIA, and Kristin Visser. It is the definitive story of the Cottage. The previous excerpt described mechanical, electrical, and plumbing features.



Most preservation projects have a goal of restoring the structure to a specific time in history. Unfortunately the cottage was not complete at the time of Wright's and Peterson's deaths, so the rehabilitation aimed to represent "what might have been." Although the approach is unusual, the SPCC thought it appropriate, in that the cottage would ultimately stand as a tribute to both Wright and Seth Peterson.

In 1989, the cottage interior was completely in ruins. Although wooden elements such as ceiling boards, trim, and cabinetry were damaged beyond repair, enough remained to determine the original dimensions and material used. Careful measurement and documentation of the ruined pieces, combined with the original detailed drawings, enabled exact duplicates to be made. John was particularly pleased to find a coral-colored laminate that matched the original countertops.

Wright usually designed individual furniture pieces for Usonian homes. He believed "... every chair must eventually be designed for the building it is to be used in. Organic architecture calls for this chair which will not look like an apparatus but instead be seen as a gracious feature of its environment, which can only be the building itself." (*The Natural House*)

Wright's furniture designs for the cottage include tables, chairs, hassocks, a bed, side table, and built-in settle seating, none of which were ever built. Replica furniture was constructed in accordance with the original plans and specifications. The lack of historic furnishings proved to be an asset, in that the replicas now in the cottage are of little intrinsic value.

Unfortunately, the original drawings did not include designs for dining chairs. Bert Goderstad, a close friend of Peterson, believes that Seth instructed Wright not to design these components as he had built some of his own. Many preservation architects believe that "new" components such as furniture should be clearly different from historical pieces, so that the building can be properly interpreted. However, others believe the contrast between original and new furniture can disrupt the aesthetics of the project. John agreed with the latter approach and recommended that new chairs be designed to be sympathetic with the other Wright furniture. He

spent considerable time researching furniture designed by Wright in the 1950s, and designed two chair types consistent with Wright's designs of this period and the other furniture in the cottage. Upholstery fabric of texture and color similar to that which Wright often used was chosen for the chairs and settle seating. □
