PETERSON RECORDS DONATED TO COTTAGE CONSERVANCY'S ARCHIVE

In the spring 2020 issue of the Seth Peterson Cottage Conservancy newsletter, we reported with great sadness the passing of Bert Goderstad.

Bert was a childhood friend of Seth, and they shared many adventures together exploring the architecture of Frank Lloyd Wright.

When Seth died in 1960, his parents gave Bert all of Seth's materials related to the construction of the cottage. It was always Bert's intention that his collection of Seth Peterson Cottage material would be donated to the Cottage archives.

We are very grateful to Bert's wife, Margaret, and their son, Todd, for giving that material to the cottage. The material includes: two sets of the original construction drawings for the cottage; the original colored pencil perspective drawing of the cottage; a binder containing letters between Seth and Wright's secretary Gene Maselink; letters between Seth and

Bert pertaining to the cottage; and much other material that Seth had collected over the years.

Bert also had two books inscribed to Seth by Wright and one book inscribed to Seth by Olgianna Lloyd Wright that Bert had given to conservancy board member Bill Martinelli. That book also will be given to the cottage archive in the future.

We will always be grateful to Bert for his dedication to the restoration and continued management of the cottage; and to Margaret and Todd for their generous donation to its history.

However, because you can walk the trails in state parks, you are able to walk around and view the cottage from outside on open house days, which are held the second Sunday of each month.

This issue of our newsletter includes an article announcing the Kristin Visser Historical Preservation Award. The award seeks applications from owners or organizations that have done substantial work to restore a Wright or Prairie School building. Please spread the word to encourage people to complete and send in their applications.

Requirements for board members include an interest in Wright's work and, specifically, the Seth Peterson Cottage.

As the year comes to a close, we want to thank one of our long-time conservancy board members for his service to the Seth Peterson Cottage Conservancy. Paul Wagner, a Taliesin fellow and life-long architect, joined the board and soon accepted the treasurer's position, although his skills were more in architecture than bookkeeping.

He has decided to not run for re-election to the board at the expiration of his current term. Thank you, Paul, for a job well done, and best wishes for future endeavors.

This vacancy creates the opportunity for another person to join the board of directors for the Seth Peterson Cottage Conservancy. MIRROR LAKE STATE PARK REPORT

I hope this article finds everyone well.

We have closed out another summer season at Mirror Lake State Park, and it certainly has been an unusual one. With the response to COVID-19 and widespread public health concerns, we operated in a variety of new and adjusted ways. Some of the unusual things this summer included a delayed opening to our campgrounds, shelters and accessible cabin. We also were unable to open our park office for public access, and we had to keep playgrounds closed all summer.

Despite these operational changes, our staff remained hard at work across the park, providing excellent service to visitors. Even with the office closed, staff answered the phones and sold admission stickers that were mailed out to customers. Our maintenance staff cleaned buildings, mowed the grass, took care of the park facilities and worked on many projects around the park. Park rangers and conservation wardens patrolled the park and ensured a safe and enjoyable experience for visitors.

Summer months saw what is sure to be record attendance. Our campgrounds were full every weekend — which is common — and were three-quarters full or more during the weekdays — which is less common.

Additionally, we needed to close the park for day-use access many weekends, due to reaching capacity. That meant that we had filled all our available parking and that facilities were at the limit of what they can support.

I think many people were looking for a place where they felt safe getting out of the house. The park was where they chose to go.

The visitation totals for the summer are yet to come in, and it remains to be seen how everything will come out in the end. As I mention above, we saw very high attendance for several months, but we were completely closed for several weeks and missed almost two months of the camping season.

The high use across the rest of the season will hopefully be enough to make up for some of the lost revenue. I mention revenue because even though we are a part of a state agency, the Wisconsin state park system operates on revenue generated through our use fees and not with tax dollars.

Even though we are winding down our high-use season, the park will remain busy in the fall as our visitors enjoy viewing fall colors, hiking, boating and camping. The park will see many people skiing, snowshoeing, ice fishing and (for folks braver than me) camping in the winter months.

Many of our staff are leaving or have left to return to school, but we have a dedicated group of full- and part-time staff that are at the park year-round to keep things in great shape. It has been a very unusual year, and I imagine that will continue into the fall and beyond.

The dedication of our staff to providing a safe and enjoyable

CONSERVANCY RENEWS STATE LEASE TO MANAGE THE PETERSON COTTAGE

In July, Kermit Traska and Bill Martinelli, president and first vice president, respectively, of the Seth Peterson Cottage Conservancy signed a new 15-year lease with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. The original lease for this unique public/private operation was drafted and signed in 1989 and subsequently renewed in 2004.

Thousands of guests have been able to enjoy a stay in this work of art, and many more have enjoyed educational tours. By entering into a third 15-year lease, the conservancy is agreeing to continue to restore, manage and operate the cottage through 2035.

ENTRIES SOUGHT FOR 2021 AWARD

PROGRAM RECOGNIZES SIGNIFICANT PAST WORK IN HISTORIC PRESERVATION

The deadline for applications for the 2021 Kristin Visser Historical Preservation Award is March 15, 2021.

The award, given by the directors of the Seth Peterson Cottage Conservancy, is presented every other year to an individual or organization in recognition of past work in historical preservation of a Frank Lloyd Wright or Prairie School building in Wisconsin or a contiguous state. In general, buildings constructed between 1900 and 1925 are given preference, and the restoration work shall have been substantially completed within the two calendar years previous to the year of application. The 2019 award will be given for work done during 2018 and 2019.

The award is in the amount of \$5,000 and includes recognition at the Seth Peterson Cottage.

There is no specific application form. Applicants are asked to support their submission with the following information: a statement fully describing the restoration project that includes its state of completion; a supporting statement from the building contractor and/or architect; a letter or letters of support from scholars and/or working professionals familiar with the project; photographic evidence of work completed; and any other pertinent supporting materials. Submissions will be judged by a panel of members of the Seth Peterson Cottage Conservancy, along with several outside experts/scholars.

The award recipient will be announced on April 11, 2021, and the award presented on June 13, 2021.

The award is named in honor of Kristin Visser, who was one of the people instrumental in the restoration of the Seth Peterson Cottage and a tireless worker on its behalf. She is the author of "Frank Lloyd Wright and the Prairie School in



Wisconsin," and, with John Eifler, A.I.A., "Frank Lloyd Wright's Seth Peterson Cottage: Rescuing a Lost Masterwork." Visser, a planner for the Wisconsin State Department of Natural Resources, died in 1998 at the age of 48.

The Seth Peterson Cottage is Wright's final Wisconsin commission (1958) and, at only 880 square feet, one of his smallest. It was rescued from ruin by the concerted efforts of a local group of lakeshore property owners, spearheaded by Audrey Laatsch, and restored through a public/private partnership.

The inaugural award was given in 2007 to Steve Sikora and Lynette Erickson-Sikora for their work in restoring the Willey House, in Minneapolis.

The 2009 award was granted to Paul A. Harding and Cheryl Harding for their work in restoring the Davenport House, in River Forest, Illinois.

The 2011 award was presented to Mary Arnold and Henry St. Maurice for their work on the E. Clarke Arnold


The 2013 award was presented to Frank Lloyd Wright Wisconsin for the restoration of the B-1 American System-Built home in Milwaukee.

The 2015 award was given to John Eifler and Bonnie Phoenix for the restoration of the Ross House in Glencoe, Illinois.

The 2017 award was given posthumously to Gene Szymczak for his restoration of the Thomas P. Hardy House in Racine, Wisconsin.

The 2019 award was given to Doug LaBrecque for his restoration of the Curtis and Lillian Meyer House in Galesburg, Michigan.

MIRROR LAKE ASSOCIATION REPORT

The summer of 2020 has been different and more difficult than any of the past. With the COVID-19 virus out there as a threat to our health, the Mirror Lake Association cancelled all of our social activities this summer to maintain a safe environment.

We were able to continue our conservation work, even though we had to delay the start of some of that work. We did

get our spring road clean-up work accomplished - thanks to volunteers who went out on their own to do the work on various days in May.

We started lake water testing in mid-summer when the labs that read the tests opened. Previously they were closed as a non-essential service. In mid-summer when machine parts stores began opening up, we could buy the needed supplies to start-up our lake harvester for the year and began harvesting about a month late. Fortunately, the weather cooperated and the lake vegetation didn't grow much early on, so the delay didn't create too big a problem.

We did decide to not operate our Clean Boats, Clean Waters program that checks incoming boats for invasive species. That work requires a lot of personal contact, and we didn't want to risk any of our staff to any preventable risk.

All of these important lake conservation projects will get underway again next year, so we continue to monitor and maintain Mirror Lake.


